

Supply List for Art Camp at GBC – September 24 to September 28

Paint

Fluid Acrylics or Heavy Body Acrylics

Fluid Acrylics are easier to manage and easier to mix.

If you would rather bring:

Watercolours or

Pastels – oil or chalk - The choice is up to you

Please note: do not bring oil paints – we are not set up for them.

Colours:

Primary yellow

Primary blue or cyan

Primary magenta or red

Unbleached titanium

White

Carbon black

Polymer medium – gloss and/or matte

If you would like to bring many other colours, please do so eg. Teal

Some brands are: Tri Art, Golden, Liquitex,

DeSerres has their own store brand of paints. Some paints are labeled “student” and are not quite as good, but less expensive.

Brushes

Large brushes (2 , 3 , 4 or wider)inches – you can find them in a hardware store

Round and flat brushes #4 or #6 or #8 or #10 , watercolour brushes or acrylic brushes – both flat and round brushes.

Palette knives or any other utensils that you can “push paint around” eg a brayer

Paper /Canvases

3 sheets of 140 lb. hot press watercolour paper – great to practice on - and as many canvases as you would like – size your choice.

Canvases come in a variety of types – some are called student or regular and others may be called gallery – they are a bit more expensive.

Other

Sketch book – pen and pencil

Apron

Paper towels – blue ones at Canadian Tire – if you have a chance – they are very absorbent.

Palette – use an old metal cookie sheet or Styrofoam tray (8'x16") with a roll of tin foil.

Saran wrap

Plastic tablecloths (rectangle) to cover the table and floor (find at Dollar Store).

Plastic containers (eg. Yogurt) for water.

Spray bottle - (large) at Dollar Store

Optional: vinyl gloves to protect your hands

Collage items to glue on your painting to provide texture

Paint Stores: DeSerres. Currys, Michaels

Staff in the stores is usually quite helpful.
